




Washington International Rachmaninoff Music Competition

- The Washington International Rachmaninoff Music Competition (WIRMC) is co-organized by the Washington Rachmaninoff Musician Association and Fantasia Music Institute and has been invited to be member of the Alink-Argerich Foundation (AAF).
- This year's competition includes piano and string instruments and will be divided into the preliminary rounds, Regional Finals, Global Finals, and an award-winning concert during the summer camp.

Competition introduction

- The Washington International Rachmaninoff Piano and Strings Competition is a prestigious eventa ttracting musicians worldwide. It caters to professional and amateur categories, including pianoa nd strings, to accommodate different musicians' needs.
- In the professional category, this competition emphasizes the interpretation of works by the Russian composer Sergei Vasilyevich Rachmaninoff (1873-1943), a highly influential composer, pianist, and conductor. Rachmaninoff's music combines romantic passion with Russian national style, demands high skill and deep musical understanding.
- For the amateur category, the competition does not require participants to perform Rachmaninoff's works. This category aims to provide a more relaxed and encouraging environment for music lovers to showcase their talents, regardless of skill level.
- Whether professional or amateur, this competition offers an excellent platform to showcase musical talents, learn new skills, and connect with other musicians. By interacting and collaborating with excellent musicians from around the world, participants gain valuable experience and inspiration.

Competition precautions

- Professional Group B, C and Performance Artist Group must prepare two pieces of different styles,
 including one piece from S.V.Rachmaninoff.
- All solo categories, except chamber music, must be performed from memory.
- String solo participants needing piano accompaniment should bring their accompanist.
- Amateur and professional groups compete separately.
- The competition is open to participants of all nationalities.
- The competition may be postponed or switched to an online format in weather or unforeseen circumstances.
- The organizers have the right to use any photos and videos taken during the competition for promotional purposes without consent or payment.
- Participants can use the same or different pieces in each round, but they must meet the repertoire requirements for their group.
- Professional group participants must be students of conservatories/music schools or university music
 departments. If participants are not studying in these schools but still wish to register for the
 professional group, a recommendation letter from an expert teacher in the corresponding field
 from the above schools is required.
- Participants should register for the competition in the division corresponding to their place of residence. If there is no division in their place of residence, they can register for other divisions or the online division.
- Registration fees are non-refundable except for force majeure circumstances beyond human control.
 - *The organizing committee reserves the right to interpret and modify the rules.

Online Video Submission Guidelines:

- a. Recordings should be captured from a single, stationary camera position at an appropriate distance.
 For piano performances, the camera should be angled from the right side to ensure that the performer's hands, face, and feet are clearly visible.
- b. Contestants are not required to provide self-introductions, and the video must not include any subtitles or on-screen text that discloses the contestant's personal information or the location of the recording.
- c. Videos must not be edited in any way. Any editing will result in disqualification. For the professional category, both pieces must be performed consecutively in a single, unedited video. The video quality and audio clarity are critical factors that will influence the competition outcome.
- d. Contestants are expected to be dressed in formal attire and maintain a neat and tidy appearance during the video recording.

Competition Awards Winners Concert

Preliminary Round:

The competition will award First Prize, Second Prize, Third Prize, and Merit Award, with the winners of the First and Second Prizes advancing to the Regional Finals.

For the online preliminary round, winners will receive electronic certificates of achievement awarded by the Washington Rachmaninoff Musicians Association.



North America Region Finals / Global Finals and Award Concert:

Regional Finals will award gold, silver, and bronze prizes, with a special Rachmaninoff Prize.

- One "Most Promising Award" for the Piano Amateur Group, with a cash prize of 300 USD.
- One "Most Promising Award" for the Strings Amateur Group, with a cash prize of 300 USD.
- One Rachmaninoff Prize for the Piano Professional Group, with a cash prize of 400 USD.
- One Best Performance Award for the Strings Professional Group, with a cash prize of 400 USD.
- * All winners will be selected to participate in the summer camp and global finals in the USA in 2026 and will receive a certificate, trophy, and a total scholarship exceeding \$100,000 for the summer camp, including a performance at Carnegie Hall.
